Your letter has been forwarded to me by Mrs. Glen Long, President General. I am sorry that I have not had the opportunity to answer you sooner, but the sudden feath of my husband has kept me from doing many things. I am now trying to get back on my feet.

So far I have not been able to look into the Evans family, but I can assure you that I amomost interested. My own family name is Evans and I am planning to do some research on that myself. I know that John Alexander Evans and Joseph A. Evans were brothers who originally came from Virginia. Joseph Evans died a prisoner of war at Fort Pike. John Evans, my grandfather, was wounded at the Battle of Vicksburg. As soon as I have an opportunity I will see what I can do. There has been very little that we have been able to get.

I will mention your request in my U. D. C. column and see if there is any help from that source.

There are not too many Evanses in this state. It might be that this could be part of the same clan. We found in many instances that different families in Louisiana migrated to Texas and came back to Louisiana again. I have followed that many times. Did you contact Mrs. Jaco? I would like to know what you heard from her. I will check the Louisiana records for Samuel Evans and you will hear from me again.
