BATTLE OF JUTLAND

1. During the period 17-26 January, the Senior Class will present the history of the Battle of Jutland.

2. The background will be presented with the aid of specially prepared charts. The Tactics will be illustrated by re-playing the battle on the Maneuver Board. Operations will be criticized at appropriate stages.

3. The Board Maneuver will be made in accordance with the plates contained in the pamphlet, "Jutland, Fifth War College Edition: September 1926; reprinted and revised, June 1927 - Frost and Hazard". The battle will be played by moves, each move consisting of a series of plates, commencing with plate 15 (2:15 p.m.). As each move is made, the history of the move will be given by the students commanding the forces involved.
4. The attached sheets show the assignment of student officers and the duties required of them.

5. The reading necessary to the presentation of Jutland will be done at the discretion of the student.

6. Students are furnished with combined lists of German and British messages. These are a great contribution to the understanding of the decisions made by the commanders, and the background of information on which these decisions were made. ٠.

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PROCEDURE

The tracks of opposing forces for an appropriate period of time will be laid out on the maneuver board by the War College Staff. The initial position of miniature ships will be the 2:15 p.m. position as shown in plate 15 (Jutland, Fifth War College Edition).

Before the first move is made on the board, the background of the battle will be presented as outlined in subjects (a), (b), (c), (d) and (e). Specially prepared charts will be hung in the Game Room to aid in these presentations.

Move 1 will be called for.

Each officer assigned to the command of one of the units appearing on the board will move his unit to the final position as indicated in the accompanying table, or as may be specially directed, and will report to his commander that the move has been made. Thus, officers assigned to the command of units of the Grand Fleet will report to Admiral Jellicoe that their unit has been moved for Move 1. Similarly, officers commanding units of the Battle Cruiser Squadron will report to Admiral Beatty. The procedure on the German side will be the same. Commandersin-Chief will report to the Director when all their forces have made the move.

When all the forces have been reported moved, the Director will call on the Commanders-in-Chief to present the history of the move from the point of view of the high command. Subordinates in turn will be called on for their narratives.

Histories will be related by the officer designated to represent the actual commander in the battle, who should rise, proceed onto the game board, take the pointer, announce himself by name, as "Commodore Goodenough, commanding Second Light Cruiser Squadron", and proceed to relate and point out the events of the move as relating to his command. A personal sketch of the character represented is of interest as an introduction in the cases of the principal commanders.

The attention of all officers is called to the discrepancy that exists between the times used in the various narratives of the battle. The time used on the plates in "Jutland" is Greenwich mean time, and the same is true of practically all of the British accounts of the battle. The German official accounts have, in general, been adjusted to Central Europe Standard Time, that is, one hour later than Greenwich mean time. But the German logs were kept by Central Europe Daylight Saving Time, and are therefore, generally, two hours later than Greenwich mean time, and one hour later than the Central Europe Standard Time used in the German official accounts. In preparing notes for the presentation it will be necessary to keep the above facts in mind and adjust the times to the times used on the plates in "Jutland, Fifth War College Edition". <u>2812</u> 1/16/33

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The following will be the moves as called for in the presentation of the battle: MOVE One - Contact by light forces, procedure of Light 2:15 to 3:30 Forces to contact by the Battle Cruisers. Plates 15, 16, 17, 18. MOVE Two - The Battle Cruiser action from contact to contact 3:30 to 4:30 with the German Main Fleet. Plates 19, 20, 21, 22. MOVE Three - German Main Fleet enters the Action and the 4:30 to 5:35 Pursuit of the Battle Cruiser Fleet. Plates 23, 24, 25. MOVE Four - Junction of Battle Cruiser Fleet with the Grand 5:35 to 6:20 Fleet. Deployment of the Grand Fleet. Plates 26, 27, 28. MOVE Five - Engagement of Battle Fleets. 6:20 to 6:55 First Retirement of the High Seas Fleet. Plates 29, 30, 31, 32, 33, 34, 35. MOVE Six - Advance of the High Seas Fleet - Re-engagement 6:55 to 7:15 of Battle Fleets. Plates 36, 37, 38, 39. MOVE Seven - Second Retirement of the High Seas Fleet. German 7:15 to 7:35 Destroyer Attacks. Plates 40, 41, 42, 43. MOVE Eight - Disengagement complete. Dispositions for the 7:35 to 8:35 <u>night</u>. Plates 44, 45, 46. MOVE Nine - The Twilight Cruise and Early Contacts. 8:35 to 10:50 Plates 47, 48, 49, 50. <u>MOVE Ten</u> - <u>Nig</u> 10:50 to 3:00 a.m. - Night Actions and the Escape of the High Seas Fleet. Plates 51, 51A, B, C, D, E, F, G.

(a) British Naval Situation - May 1916
Proposed tactical employment of the Grand
Fleet as outlined in Admiral Jellicoe's letter of October 1914 and other pertinent circumstances since the date of this letter.
Disposition of the Grand Fleet on 30 May 1916.

(b) German Naval Situation - May 1916. The operations planned for the German Fleet, the events that prevented these operations being carried out as planned and the substitute plan adopted. The disposition of the High Seas Fleet on 30 May, 1916.
