- 1. Instruction concerning naval aviation at the War College deals with aircraft as a type on the same basis as capital ships, submarines and light forces.
- 2. Aircraft enter vitally into practically every strategical and tactical game played by both the Junior and the Senior Classes. In tactical games the Senior Class is more concerned with the major tactics of the battle and deals largely with the coordination of the efforts of the several types. The Junior Class, as a rule, play smaller games and study further the minor tactics of the types.
- 3. In this applicatory study of operations, the students have available all service instructions and pemphlets dealing with the type. Following each game there is a critique in which operations are criticised and fully discussed. The naval aviator on the War College Staff is the Air Umpire in the games, is available for consultation during the games (and is freely consulted) and participates in the critique.
- 4. Supplemental and preliminary to the games there is the presentation of a series of tactical papers dealing with the characteristics, capabilities and limitations of each type. A copy of the paper on the subject of Aircraft is enclosed, (A). To further illustrate the role of each of the fighting types and to indicate the manner of their coordination, the paper "The Naval Battle" is studied by the classes in this preliminary period.

- 5. In the short course on International Law there is usually one case each year dealing with the legal aspects of the employment of aircraft.
- 6. A list of the references used in tactical study and a partial list of authorities available for use in connection with the International Law cases is enclosed (B). Ultimate return of enclosures is requested.
