BATTLE OF JUTLAND

MOTIVES

1. To provide an historical study of the most recent naval battle.

2. To emphasize the influence of strate ic background upon the tactical employment of fleets.

3. To discuss and analyze the tactics employed during the Battle of Jutland.

4. To formulate lessons derived from this study for application to the future tactical employment of fleets.

REQUIRED OF STUDENTS

1. A detailed study, by individual students, of specially assigned subjects and operations of assigned forces.

2. Preparation of manuscripts and presentation of the subjects assigned in "Special Presentations", Annex A.

3. Presentations on the Maneuver Board of the operations of forces assigned in the "Command Assignments", Annex B, from the viewpoint of the Commander of the assigned force.

PROCEDURE

1. The presentations of the history of the Battle of Jutland will be conducted in the Game Room in the following general order:

(a) Phase A. Presentations and discussion of the strategic background leading up to the Batthe. In this Phase the assignments (a) to (g) inclusive, of Annex A will be presented and discussed by the students with the aid of specially prepared charts. In addition, students having assignments (h) and (i) will be called upon to give a brief resume' of the contemplated and actual operations of German submarines and aircraft immediately preceding and during the sortie of the British Grand Fleet. (The specially prepared charts, referred to above, to assist in presentations (a) to (h) inclusive have been prepared by the War College drafting room and will be posted in the Game Room.)

(b) Phase B. Graphic reproduction on the Maneuver Board of the operations of the various forces.of the British Grand Fleet and Gorman High Seas Fleet with presentations and discussion of the tactics employed. The Battle will be presented as a Board Maneuver, the students acting as the commanders of the various forces as assigned in the "Command Detail", Annex B, and being called on during the maneuver to discuss the tactics of their commands, and to deliver their assigned presentations (h) to (x) inclusive, of Annex A.

(c) Phase C. Presentations by students, of assignments (y), (z), (z-1), (z-2), Annex A, and other presentations not completed in Phase B. Further discussion of the Battle as circumstances dictate.

2. In conducting the graphic reproduction, Phase B, on the Maneuver Board, the following special procedure will govern:

(a) The time during which the forces were in contact is divided into several periods of varying length, the length of the period depending upon the action during the period. In accordance with Maneuver Board procedure each period is called a "move".

(b) The tracks of the opposing forces are laid out, by the War College Staff, on the maneuver board in accordance with the plates contained in the pamphlet "Jutland, Fifth War College Edition, September 1926". "Reprinted and revised: June 1927, Frost and Hazard".

(c) Each move consists of the operations during the period covered by one or more plates. The length of the moves with the corresponding plates are tabulated in Annex C. The initial position of the miniature ships will be the 2:15 p.m. positions as shown on Plate 15.

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(d) When a move is called for, each officer assigned to the command of one of the units appearing on the board will move his unit to the final position reached by that unit during the period covered by the move, and then report to his commander that the move has been made. Thus, officers assigned to the command of units of the British Battle Cruiser Fleet will, when their units have been moved, report this fact to Admiral Beatty; when all the units of the Battle Cruiser Fleet have been moved, Admiral Beatty will so report to Admiral Jellicoe. When all the British forces have been moved, Admiral Jellicoe will report this fact to the Director. The procedure for German forces will be the same.

(e) When all forces have been reported moved the Director will call upon the officers, in turn, to present the operations of their commands during the move. The officer designated should rise, proceed onto the maneuver board, take the pointer, announce himself by name, as "Commodore Goodenough, Commanding Second Light

Cruiser Squadron", and proceed to relate and point out the important events and tactical action pertaining to his command. When appropriate he should comment upon tactical features, reasons for success or failure, lessons to be learned, etc . When a unit first appears on the board a brief summary of the personal character and previous experience of the commander of the unit should be given.

(f) Discussion of the operations and tactical features involved in each move will be invited upon completion of the presentation thereof.

(g) The Students will be called on, at appropriate times during the progress of the Battle on the maneuver board, to deliver their assigned "Special Presentations", (h) to (x), Annex A.

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PREPARATION FOR PRESENTATIONS

1. Students are requested to search the various sources of material in the library and archives so as to be able to present a complete picture of the action from the viewpoint of the commanders they represent.

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2. Students are furnished with combined lists of German and British messages. These are a great contribution to the understanding of the decisions made by the commanders, and the background of information on which these decisions were made.

3. Students should endeavor to place themselves in the position of the officer whom they are assigned to represent in the presentation of the battle. They should endeavor to ascertain the reasons for the actions that were taken.

4. The attention of students is called to the discrepancy between the times used in the various narratives of the battle. The times given on the plates in "Jutland" are Greenwich Mean Time, which is used in practically all British accounts of the battle. The German official accounts have, in general, been adjusted to Central Europe Standard Time, which is one hour later than Greenwich Mean Time. The German logs used Central Europe Daylight Saving Time, and are, generally, two hours later than Greenwich Mean Timo. In preparing notes for the presentation it will be necessary to keep the above facts in mind and adjust all times to Greenwich Mean Time.

5. A list of books and articles available in the library and archives is attached as Annex D. There are also available in Room 206, for reference manuscripts propared by previous classes, but students are requested, if utilizing these manuscripts, to use the data contained therein only as a general guide. Manuscripts and Presentations based on research work by the students will be of greater benefit to the present and future studies of the Battle of Jutland.
